In 2008 Yana and her family moved to Canada and settled here in London, where her husband Mark was born and raised, as he was offered a position at the Diocesan Centre. Four years later Yana became a Canadian citizen.

Yana and her husband Mark and their three children joined St. Michael's parish in 2010. Yana has been involved in a number of Children's ministries as well as St. Michael's Moms group.
